Free dress day

Encourage everyone to bring a gold coin donation & come dressed in:

- French-inspired outfits, like berets, striped tops, or anything Parisian
- the colours of the French flag: blue, white, red
- OR represent a Francophone country by wearing its colours.



- Hide mini flags of Francophone countries around the school.
- Gold coin entry fee gives a chance to search for flags to make up a full set of flags. Students can swap flags if they find 2 the same.

Tour de France

- Create your own Tour de France!
- Students pay between \$2 and \$5 to enter the race.
- They have 20 minutes craft their cardboard bicycles, (must have wheels, a seat, handlebars, and pedals) before completing the race around the course provided.
- Judging could be based on speed or creativity, or on points for both.

Play a game!

Who will be the ultimate master of Escargot? Set up 10 courts with 5 players each, or vary to suit the size of your school. Students pay \$1 to play and the 5 winners get to compete for the title in the championship round.

Open a Parisian cafe

CHOCOLAT CHAUD

This delicious French hot chocolate is easy to make in large batches. The most important thing is not to overheat it.

Ingredients

5 L fulll crem milk


1.3 kg dark chocolate, finely chopped or grated

300 g brown sugar - or more or less to taste

Instructions

- 1. Heat milk until very warm but not boiling, then turn heat off, add chocolate and stir until melted.
- Turn heat back on to medium and stir without boiling for two minutes or until it thickens.
- 3. Stir in sugar to taste and serve.





Ingredients

80 g unsalted butter, plus extra for cooking 240 g plain flour 360 ml milk 240 ml water 4 large eggs

Instructions

- 1. Melt 80 g butter then allow to cool.
- 2. Mix the cooled, melted butter and other ingredients in a food processor or by hand with a whisk.
- 3. Leave mixture, covered in the fridge for an hour or even overnight.
- 4. Melt butter in a frying pan over medium heat. Add 3-4 tablespoons of mixture. Tilt and swirl the pan so the mixture spreads out thin.
- 5. Once crepe has set, flip and cook other side.
- 6. Repeat with remaining mixture.
- 7. Top with sweet or savoury fillings such as jam, nutella, berries and cream or grated cheese.

FOUR TIPS FOR A SUCCESSFUL CRÉPE SALE

1. Prep ingredients in advance

Pre-measure the batter ingredients and mix them the night before to save time on the day. Store the batter in the fridge and give it a quick stir before cooking.

2. Keep the menu simple

Offer only two or three topping options. This keeps the process efficient and reduces decision fatigue for customers.

3. Set up an efficient assembly line

Assign specific roles: one person cooks, one adds toppings, and one handles payments. This speeds up service during busy periods.

4. Keep crêpes warm

Use a warming tray or stack cooked crêpes under foil to keep them fresh while waiting for toppings.

How to play Escargot

Escargot is one of the most traditional French games still played today. It's a variation of hopscotch with ancient origins, but instead of a grid, players draw a large spiral in the shape of a snail. This spiral is then divided into 10 to 20 squares.

1

Draw the snail: Create a spiral on the ground with chalk, dividing it into 15-20 squares.

2

Hopping to the centre:

- Players take turns hopping on one foot along the snail's path to reach the centre.
- Once a player reaches the centre, they can claim one square by marking it with their initials in chalk.

3

Avoiding claimed squares:

On subsequent turns, players must hop around any claimed squares without stepping on them. If a player touches a claimed square or loses their balance, they lose their turn.

4

Winning the game:

- The game becomes more challenging as more squares are claimed.
- The player who has claimed the most squares when the snail is full is the winner!







Flag hunt - rules


Make toothpick flags of named Francophone countries as a class activity and decide whether to vary their value based on population, language status, size or any other feature, to add to the excitement and learning.

Eleven countries have French as their sole official language: Benin, D.R. Congo, France, Gabon, Guinea, Ivory Coast, Monaco, Niger, R. Congo, Senegal and Togo. Sixteen others have it as one of their official languages.


Hide between 2 and 10 whole sets of flags to ensure the right amount of finding satisfaction for the number of expected searchers.

Gold coin entry fee gives a chance to search for flags until the time runs out, maybe 10 mins before the end of lunch break? Students can swap flags with each other if they find two the same.

The winner is the player with the most countries represented at the end of the game, or the highest score, if you varied the value of flags.
